### **Checking in with Custodial Services**

Custodial Services continues to clean and disinfect areas being used on campus. With faculty and staff only occasionally being in the office to remotely teach a class, conduct research, or handle administrative matters, the need for custodial services has reduced. In academic and administrative facilities, our team works Monday through Friday to disinfect high-touch areas, clean public restrooms and entryways, and empty trash. In residence halls and dining facilities they're providing additional coverage on weekends and into the evenings as needed. In facilities that are closed, such as the Athletic facilities, no routine service is being provided. Most staff are working first shift, although there is a skeletal crew on second and third shifts to provide coverage and respond to emergencies.

During this period custodians are working on a weekly, rotational basis with approximately 20% working on campus. As expected, Custodial Services employees are taking all necessary precautions to assure the health and safety for themselves and building occupants.
