Talent Abounds in the EM Shop

The Equipment Maintenance (EM) shop is one of the technical trade shops in Facilities Operations & Management (FO&M) and is responsible for maintaining all the mechanical equipment on campus.

If the EM shop had a motto, it might be 'out of sight, but <u>not</u> out of mind'. "Most of the equipment we maintain is hidden from sight," explains supervisor Gregg Poretto, "and so are we. We enjoy being behind the scenes and hardly noticed, because this means we are doing our jobs."

EM shop professionals improve the reliability and performance of various systems on campus, ranging from HVAC (heating/ventilation and air conditioning) systems to welding, subterranean infrastructure repairs, chilled water plan maintenance, athletic equipment repairs, and much more. Their work, which Poretto describes as "basically anything that moves," is mostly preventative in nature, to avoid major equipment problems

down the road. These photos show underground infrastructure work, specifically rebuilding steam manhole #24 located near McNutt. The team disassembled the old piping and replaced it with new with all the mechanical work done in-house.

The 14 talented crew members include 4 licensed master plumbers, 1 certified welder, 3 certified refrigeration techs, 1

licensed master electrician, 2 certified LP gas/oil techs, 1 certified steamfitter, and 4 experienced building maintenance mechanics.

"The current EM Shop crew is the best crew assembled since I became the EM supervisor in 2004," Poretto notes. "We're a light-hearted group of professionals who don't take anything too seriously, because we're secure and confident in our abilities." What a awesome success story!
