A New Recycling Solution

FO&M recently purchased for the trash & recycling crew a third compactor truck to be used exclusively for cardboard. According to Assoc. Director of FO&M Tim McNamara, "cardboard is the only recyclable material from which we derive revenue. The volume of cardboard per student has increased dra-

matically over the past several years and, we believe, will continue to grow as Amazon and similar services become the preferred purchasing method for students. At the same time, the value of recycled cardboard also continues to increase."

Two factors have led us to

invest in a compactor truck that is dedicated to picking up cardboard on campus. 1. Cardboard must be dry to be recyclable; we have lost the value of multiple loads of cardboard due to rain when it was combined with other materials in our dumpster. 2. In the past, cardboard was collected from multiple locations around campus in an open truck and then manually loaded into an open top dumpster at the Gile Tract. Casella would then periodically remove the dumpster, weigh the contents, and compensate us accordingly. With the new truck, we can take the cardboard directly to Casella's processing facility in White River Junction. This allows the crew to only handle the cardboard once, thereby cutting in half the number of pounds handled.

In addition, facilities contracts and process coordinator Susie Weider mentions, "we will save on the annual Casella haul fees which are significant and, as Tim mentions, increase the commodity revenue for the cardboard as it will be in better condition." This seems like a win-win solution all the way around. Great job!

"We are writing to let you know how grateful the biology department is for the truly outstanding work that painters Bobby Ignjatovic and Jon Blake have done recently in the Class of 1978 Life Sciences Center.



As you know, some of the COVID disinfection procedures compromised wooden surfaces that had been sealed with polyurethane. The wood laminate was exposed and lifting on most of the interior doors, gallery tables, classroom lecterns and the wooden desks in two of the classrooms.

The work Bobby and Jon did in Oopik Auditorium is an excellent representation of quality and completeness of their work as well as their remarkable efficiency. Oopik has twenty-three rows of desks and a wooden lectern. They sanded, stained, puttied screw holes, and applied two coats of polyurethane to the lectern, desktops and desk front panels in fewer than two weeks. They also painted the half walls in the room. The work has so restored the room that it looks like it did when the building opened in 2011.

Beyond the appearance of the room, the work they have done to restore the wood surfaces has stopped the deterioration of the surfaces. This work will protect the doors, desks and lecterns for many years and will save the college the thousands of dollars that would have been needed to replace these structures.

All of the work they have done in LSC has been done to the same high standards that are visible in Oopik Auditorium.

We are also grateful to Chris Peck who refinished the gallery tables at the shop in McKenzie. They look new!

We are not surprised by the excellent work done by Bobby, Jon and Chris over the last few weeks. They have worked at this level each time we have had the good fortune to work with them in LSC."
